## INSTRUCTION FOR AUTHORS

**Dear authors,**

Thank you for your willingness to support the 2023 *Károli Forum* with your written contributions.

The papers prepared for the Forum are to be published as separate conference proceedings (publication with an ISBN number).

We welcome papers in Hungarian and English.

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### Article outline

- The title should be short, concise and expressive.
- The author's name appears on the right end of the line above the title.
- Articles are introduced by an abstract of about 800–1000 characters, containing the main hypotheses, statements and conclusions. The abstract ends with 5–10 keywords.

**We invite those interested for publication to send the title of their article, name(s) of the author(s), together with an abstract and keywords to our e-mail address no later than April 10, 2023.**

- Manuscripts are accepted electronically, in the form of a Microsoft Word *.doc* or *.docx* file.

**The deadline for manuscript submission: May 19, 2023.**

- Manuscripts are being assessed by double-blind peer review.

## Editing guide

- An average length of articles should be between 10,000–30,000 characters (with spaces).
- On the first page, as an initial separate footnote (\*), please indicate the following details about the author(s): degree/title, affiliation or profession, title, position, workplace, and e-mail address.

*E.g.:*

Jana Voráčová\*

\*PhD, research associate, Social Sciences Institute Ostrava (j.voracova@ssio.cz).

- Emphasis in the text can be in italics. Quotations are in regular font style, indicated by quotation marks (“-”), not in italics.
- Subheadings are without numbering, clearly separated by an enter key. The maximum number of sublevels is three.

*E.g.:*

BERLIN WALL

**Social background**

*Post-war Germany*

## References

- The reference list should be included at the end of the paper, under the heading “References”. The list should include, in alphabetical order: the full name of the author(s) (starting with the surname in BLOCK LETTERS), the year of publication, the exact title of the work, place of publication, publisher; in case of journal articles: the exact title, year, volume, issue, and page numbers (from-to). In case of collected volumes, the name of the editor is given after *In*: unless the author is himself the editor of the collected volume.

- In the text, it is sufficient to cite the surname, the year and, in the case of a verbatim citation, the page number. In-text citations are enclosed in brackets, the surname and year are separated by a comma and the page number is separated from the year by a colon. In the case of two authors, the surnames of the authors are separated by a dash. For more than two authors, use “et al.”.

*E.g.:*

(Heller, 1995:29); (Beňová–Szentesi, 2021:149); (Kovács et al., 2015:10–12).

- Only items referenced in the text should be included in the bibliography, and vice versa, all literature referenced should be included in the bibliography.
- The paper may contain explanatory notes, which are to be numbered consecutively (1, 2, 3, etc.) and indicated as footnotes.
