

INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

Dear authors,

We would like to thank you for your willingness to participate in the **International Károli Forum 2026** with your written contributions.

The papers prepared for the Forum will be published as separate conference proceedings (as publications with an ISBN).

We welcome submissions in English, Hungarian, and Serbian, as well as in any of the official languages of the Autonomous Province of Vojvodina (Croatian, Romanian, Slovak, or Ruthenian).

Abstract & Keywords

The title should be short, concise, and expressive.

Each article must be accompanied by an abstract of maximum 1,500 characters, presenting the main hypotheses, arguments, and conclusions. The abstract should conclude with 5–10 keywords.

Authors are invited to provide the title of their article, the name(s) of the author(s), as well as the abstract and keywords, via our **online submission form**.

Abstracts submission deadline: 10 March 2026

Manuscripts

Manuscripts should be submitted electronically, in the form of a Microsoft Word .doc or .docx file, on the correspondence email address.

Manuscripts are being assessed by double-blind peer review.

Manuscripts submission deadline: 15 April 2026

Editing guide

The average length of articles should be between 3,000 and 8,000 words.

Emphasis in the text can be in *italics*. Quotations are in regular font style, indicated by quotation marks (“---”), not in italics.

Subheadings are without numbering, clearly separated by an enter key. The maximum number of sublevels is three.

E.g.:

BERLIN WALL

Social background

Post-war Germany

In case of inserting charts, tables, or similar data visualization tools, please be reminded that conference proceedings are printed in black and white.

References

The reference list should be included at the end of the paper, under the heading “Bibliography”. The list should include, in alphabetical order: the full name of the author(s) (starting with the surname in BLOCK LETTERS), the year of publication, the exact title of publication (*italics*), place of publication, publisher; in case of journal articles: the exact title, year, journal (*italics*), volume, issue, and page numbers (from-to). In case of collected volumes, the name of the editor is given after In: unless the author is himself the editor of the collected volume.

TAMÁS Gáspár Miklós (2010): A munkás. Bipoláris szindrómák : The Worker. Bipolar Disorders. In: Angel, Judit (szerk.) *A pult mögött : Over The Counter*. Budapest: Műcsarnok, 58–79.

In the text, it is sufficient to cite the surname, the year and, in the case of a verbatim citation, the page number. In-text citations are enclosed in brackets, the surname and year are separated by a comma and the page number is separated from the year by a colon. In the case of two authors, the surnames of the authors are separated by a dash. For more than two authors, use “et al.”.

E.g.:

(Heller, 1995: 29); (Beňová–Szentesi, 2021: 149); (Kovács et al., 2015: 10–12).

Only items referenced in the text should be included in the bibliography, and vice versa, all literature referenced should be included in the bibliography.

The paper may contain explanatory notes, which are to be numbered consecutively (1, 2, 3, etc.) and indicated as footnotes (not endnotes).
